

## Wild and Scenic Loxahatchee River

The Loxahatchee River was the first Wild & Scenic River in Florida, receiving the federal designation on May 17, 1985. Nearly half of the river, from Riverbend Park to the Boy Scout camp, is designated "Wild & Scenic". This portion of the river is completely undeveloped and provides excellent habitat for Florida's native wildlife, such as turtles, alligators, raccoons, ospreys, and the endangered wood stork. "Loxahatchee" in Seminole means "turtle river" so be sure to look for the yellow-bellied slider turtles that give the river its name.

As you journey down this part of the river, you will take a trip back in time to see South Florida as it likely was over 100 years ago. The undeveloped landscape offers spectacular animal watching opportunities and breathtaking nature photography. The river current

is slow and gentle. The Wild and
Scenic part of the river is largely
freshwater and supports native
habitats such as cypress swamps,
freshwater marshes, and
hardwood hammocks. Near
Kitching Creek, you will begin to notice
mangroves dominating the landscape,
signaling an increase in salinity to brackish water

(part salt and part fresh water). Saltwater flows into the Loxhatchee River through its mouth at Jupiter Inlet.

## **ENJOY THE RIVER!**

This is your river! Enjoy it and protect it. A few things to remember while you are out on the river: always wear a life jacket while on the water, wear a hat and sunscreen, and bring drinking water.

Respect our wildlife - please do not feed the animals; their natural diet is not in your knapsack. Alligators, snakes, and raccoons are wild animals and could be dangerous if approached.

**Remove your trash** - Keep the river beautiful. Take only pictures, leave only footprints.
